Club Evening with 'Pace Egging Play' • 2nd April 2012

"Nervous actors, but fun, we booed and clapped in all the right places and were rewarded with tiny Easter Eggs!" — So I noted in my journal after a busy weekend. I had never heard of the Pace Egg Play until the Staplers Club Night, but 'Googled' to research:

The word 'Pace' comes from the old English word 'pasch' literally meaning 'Easter'. The Pace Egg Plays are a tradition that was once widespread throughout England, but is now only practiced in a few areas. Many plays died out after the Great War, when the men who took part in them were killed in action.

The Pace Egg Plays, which take place around Easter, are traditional village plays, with a rebirth theme, in which St George smites all challengers with his sword, and the fool, Old Toss Pot, rejoices. The drama takes the form of a violent combat between the hero and villain, in which the hero is killed and brought to life, often by a doctor. As ever, good triumphs over evil!

Halfway through the dance evening we formed our chairs into a semicircle and Ann introduced her 'Company of Mummers', who entered individually, (some with great suddenness!), and spoke their pieces, hornpiped, sung the Pace Egg Song, had fierce fights (laughter, cheers and boos!), and all ended hale and hearty!

chocolate in one evening!

Workshop: 'Dances of Gary Roodman' led by John Turner with music from Paul Hutchinson

Gary Roodman is a retired college professor who taught Statistics and Applied Mathematics. His background in that kind of problem solving has probably influenced the way he goes about writing dances. He starts with the tune - in many cases well-known 'classical pieces', he then finds elegant solutions (in a mathematical sense) to interesting dance puzzles – sequences of figures that are logical, economical, easy to follow, and that obscure the underlying complexities.

He says: "After dancers have learned one of my dances, I would like the flow of the dance to seem as inevitable as the flow of the music, with little need to concentrate on what comes next."

He now has a vast collection of very flowing, popular and interesting dances some of which will be explored in this workshop.
